SERVICE AT THE GROW GARDEN DURING SUMMER TRAINING



GWServes is a site, launched in August 2018 through the Nashman Center, that is aimed at increasing GW's community engagement and creating mutual partnerships between GW and local community partners. As the Coordinator, Tereese onboards a variety of community partners across various causes. Since the site's creation, Tereese has increased the site's users and groups to over 13,000 unique campus users, 174 subgroups, and 195 local community partners. In her role, she collects and analyzes data about GW students, staff, faculty, and community partnerships to understand how GW is making an impact in the DC community.

During the Nashman Center's first annual Changemaker Week, Tereese collaborated with a First-Year Fellow, Jacqueline, to host a session entitled, "ChangeMAKING It Work," which allowed current undergraduate and graduate students to discuss ways to engage with people who have different perspectives, identities, and experiences while also encouraging students to acknowledge their gaps in knowledge and understanding about certain topics.

Title: Research Assistant


Job Description: Kalpana wears many hats in her role as a research assistant. She oversees human subject research compliance through the GW Institutional Review Board (IRB) and coordinates logistics (i.e., recruitment, informed consent, compensation) for data collection for a National Institute of Health K01 Grant (\$613K) on brain health and cognitive aging among former college and professional football players. Kalpana and Dr. Turner secured a \$91K supplemental award to quantitatively and qualitatively assess general health and cognition of Black male caregivers of persons with dementia. Kalpana also supervises research assistants by guiding their work navigating research databases and conducting literature reviews, and supporting their personal and professional growth.

Placement Spotlight

Kalpana co-authored a manuscript, "Sleep problems are associated with academic performance among collegiate athletes," by performing literature reviews, analyzing secondary datasets (NFL Players Care Foundation Study of Retired Football Players, American College Health Association-National College Health Assessment), and managing the submission and revision processes of publications. She is thrilled to have achieved her first publication and is excited about the opportunity to earn more!

Job Description: Jacqueline's work at ODECE is best described as working in three components. The first is Identity Development. Part of Jacqueline's goal in her placement is to help make ODECE more accessible to students, and to be seen as a resource to the University that is promoting diversity and inclusion. Jacqueline is growing the office's social media presence by creating and publishing content. Jacqueline also helps ODECE offer support to the GW community by co-sponsoring events with other University Departments and organizations. She also provides support for students, faculty, and staff by setting up programming to help give students space at the University to discuss social issues and topics related to identity. 




